

### EPA'S 'CHEMICALS OF CONCERN' PROPOSAL DRAWING SCRUTINY FROM BUSINESS AND CONGRESS

he Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA) was passed in 1976 and provides the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) authority to review and regulate chemicals in commerce. TSCA was designed to ensure that products are safe for their intended use. Acting within its TSCA charter, the EPA is attempting to list eight phthalate plasticizers that have been safely used in industry for decades, as so called Chemicals of Concern.

This issue has been under review by the White House Office of Management and Budget (OMB) for more than a year. OMB is charged with reviewing proposed federal regulations for economic impact on businesses. FVA has briefed OMB on its concerns.

Of late, there has been increased attention to the issue from business and Congress. Letters from various Congressional representatives including David Cicilline (D-RI) and Dale Kildee (D-MI), as well as the United States Chamber of Commerce, have challenged the EPA's view of phthalates. It is felt that EPA's actions have had the effect of causing a signal to the marketplace that the agency wants these chemicals phased out, contradicting scientific studies that support the safety of these plasticizers in flexible vinyl applications.

### NYC Icon Chooses Vinyl

With 3.5 million visitors a year, the Empire State building needed a renovated floor for its visitor center that was durable, easy to look after, price competitive and one that would maintain the Art Deco design theme. For this busy environment, Jeter, Cook Jepson Architects (Hartford, CT) selected

Centiva (Florence, AL) and set about to create and interesting design that would honor their client's floor renovation requests. Bob Burling, principal of Jeter, Cook Jepson Architects stated, "The coloration and surface texture we used, in a chevron pattern on the 45 degree axis to the building combined very

nicely with the other 'deco-style' elements."

Magics, a homogeneous product by Centiva, is one of the most durable PVC flooring products on the market. The logo (pictured) was designed for the Empire State Building by Centiva. It can be seen close to the ticket counter by each person taking the tour of the building. Each of the 2,000 individual windows in the logo was carefully drawn in CAD by the cutting design department at Centiva.

### ADVOCACY IN ACTION

FVA Supports Resin Makers via MACT Comments to EPA



On July 28, the FVA submitted

comments on the EPA's proposed polyvinyl chloride (PVC) Maximum Achievable Control Technology (MACT) regulations (EPA-HQ-OAR-2002-0037). These comments were supplemental and supportive of comments submitted by the Resilient Floor Covering Institute, the American Chemistry Council, the Vinyl Institute, the Society of the Plastics Industry, and the National Association of Manufacturers. Pro-business comments from the EVA and others focused on the necessity of implementing changes to the PVC polymerization and stripping process before the MACT is adopted. Without such changes, the MACT, as written, could result in differences in thermal stability, particle size and particle morphology to the detriment of finished product performance and longevity. ### "Design for Environment" Project Launched on August 24

The EPA 'DfE' project was kicked-off in Washington, DC on August 24. The project is planned as an 18 - 24 month assessment of alternatives to phthalates. The DfE/EPA staff presented timelines to identify 30 phthalate alternatives to be assessed and published in a draft proposal by summer 2012. Dozens of industry representatives, including FVA, were present at the inaugural meeting. FVA members are now involved in the ongoing Working Groups which will guide the EPA process. All stakeholders may participate in the process via three committees: Steering, Toxics and Alternatives.
